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News story turning into a "Ripley's Believe It Or Not"

To introduce our readers to "a very interesting Cross Border incident", we have to step back a week Friday when our neighbour businessman, Pete Liesemer dropped us a little bit of news happenings after receiving his weekly (Thursday) delivery from Home Hardware.

(Pete is a Fourth Generation owner of Liesemer's Home Hard-ware, the Oldest Family-Owned Home Hardware in Canada. The Liesemer store has been operating "in the exact same building" all those years. Pete will be celebrat-ing 140 years on May, 2nd, 2013.)

A Home Hardware driver told Pete about an interesting visit he made to "Lehman's in Kidron, Ohio". He remarked he was speechless to see a full-sized Lobsinger Threshing Machine hanging from the ceiling. He also knew that those machines were originally manufactured here in Mildmay.

Pete took me to his office and we found out details about the store. With that info, I returned to

store. With that find, I returned to the Crier office and sent off an e-mail asking a series of questions. Founder Jay E. Lehman quickly returned this reply. "We do have a Lobsinger threshing machine on display. However I don't know anything about it except that we bought it from an Amishman who had been using it until the year we bought it... five years ago. It looks very good." He sent a couple of photos and like the Home Hardware

driver said, "the entire threshing machine was just above the checkout counter above the floor on a large shelf". (Look at the accompanying photo to see how The Lehmans managed that outstanding feat).

From past dealings with "the last living Lobsinger connection" (John E. Schmidt who is married for over sixty years to Dolores Lobsinger Schmidt) the Crier Publisher knew that each and every threshing machine manu-factured here had a large four-digit number placed on the axle board between the two front wheels. Carrick Township some two miles north of Mildmay). Tony was also a Lobsinger employee from 1950 to 1972 along with his brothers Thomas, James and Leonard.

Tony tells us he eventually sold the machine to Lome Wil-fang who unfortunately was killed in an accident and the machine was sold by auction. It's not known the list of owners from that point on, but we do know now in the year 2013 that same adorns Lehman's in Kidron (Ohio).

About the owners

Jay E. Lehman founded the business in 1955 to serve the local Amish and others without elec-

His vision was to preserve the past for future generations, "I was concerned that some day the was concerned that some day the Amish would not be able to main-tain their simple ways of life because those products would no longer be available," he said. His goal was, and still is, to provide authentic, historical products to those seeking a simpler life. Because Jay had the fore-sight to look to the past for his business, he turned a one-room country hardwire store into a low

country hardware store into a low

tech superstore.
It was in this climate that Jay R Was it ans climate that Jay decided to earry products that the Amish customers needed to preserve their way of life. He thought that maybe one day no one would be making butter churns, apple peelers and drying

When you now step into Lehmans' 1840's era barn, you'll feel like you have just stepped back one bundred years!! At Lehman's, being old-fash-

ioned is always in fashion. That's why their massive 32,000 square foot retail store contains four pre-Civil War era buildings, including a Buggy Barn cinema where you can relax on Amish-made hickory church pews while learning about organic gardening, oil-lamp restoration or wood stove main-

Museum-quality antiques line the walls and thousands of products you thought were no longer being made fill the shelves at Lehman's

You'll fall in love with the many oil lamps, handmade pot-tery and copper cookie cutters, wood-burning cook stoves and retro refrigerators, wooden and tin toys, east-iron cookware, hand tools and water pumps.

Although there are cities, villages and townships in the State of Ohio, KIDRON is an unin-

corp-orated community in south-western Sugar Creek Township in Wayne County, Ohio, United States of America

Kidron was originally settled in 1819 by a group of Swiss Mennonites wishing to escape religious persecution and poor farming conditions in their home-land in the Sonnenberg area of Switzerland near the Jura

In Switzerland, the Swiss Mennonites were referred to as "Die Stillen im Lande" which meant "the quiet people in the

They originally named their new home Sonnenberg but than later gave way to the present day name of Kidron.

With regards to education, a small public elementary school is located in Kidron for students in the first three grades and is part of the Dalton school system There is also a Central Christian School which is a private Kindergarten to Grade 12 school that is owned and operated by the Ohio Conference of the Mennonite Church.

Kidron is home to an outdoor flea market held on Thursdays and Saturdays (weather permit-ting) and since 1929 a retail store called "Kidron Town and


